MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSIONS:

- Submit all manuscripts on our ManuscriptCentral ScholarOne site: <u>https://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/usw</u>
- Submissions should have a body length of 20-25 double-spaced manuscript pages.
- Format: in 12-point text such as Times Roman or Ariel. not including references, figures, or tables, typed, double-spaced (12point font) manuscript.
- Include an abstract of no more than 120 words and 5 keywords in the manuscript file.
- Citations and references should follow APA publication guidelines.
